Sacramento County Farmer Wins \$2,500 for Central Valley Farmland Trust

In the America's Farmers Grow Communities program. This program is available through the Monsanto Fund, and gives farmers the opportunity to win \$2,500 for their favorite local nonprofit organizations. The Onetos designated the Central Valley Farmland Trust, Inc. to receive the award.

Ken Oneto was very excited to have been selected as the winner for Sacramento County. "I think America's Farmers Grow Communities is a great program," said Oneto. "I hope they do it next year and the year after that and the year after that."

The \$2,500 donation was awarded at a ceremony held October 26 at the Oneto Ranch. In its initial year,

Executive Director Message

The Central Valley Farmland Trust continues to seemingly reinvent itself.

Although there have been many twists and turns in the way we go about the business of accomplishing farmland conservation in the San Joaquin Valley, our mission has not wavered from day one.

CVFT was originally founded on the presumption that farmland mitigation initiatives would provide a significant portion of the funding for agricultural conservation easements (ACEs). In our early years, the California Department of Conservation under its California Farmland Conservancy Program (CFCP) and the Packard Foundation made up 100% of the funding. That all changed with the meltdown in the economy.

The good news is that there are considerably more willing landowners. The bad news is that the ability to readily identify viable acquisition funding is problematic. Because of the untimely hold placed on State funding over the last couple of years, we are just now in the final stages of completing several ACE projects that were initiated as far back as 2009. With the State budget unsettled, CFCP funding is tentative at best. Currently, we are utilizing funding from various (non-State) sources including the Natural Resource Conservation Service under its Farm and Ranchland Protection Program (FRPP), farmland mitigation fees from various jurisdictions, landowner donations, and outside entities who participate to satisfy mitigation requirements on specific development projects.

Even though the funding process is dysfunctional, we have closed 290 acres of ACEs since September 2010 and expect to close an additional 1,000 acres by the end of April, 2011. If difficult times demand that the Central Valley Farmland Trust reinvent itself, it will! Our mission has not wavered from day one.

the America's Farmers Grow Communities program has provided nearly 500 farmers in 10 states with \$2,500 awards to direct to their favorite nonprofit organization. In total, \$25,000 was donated to nonprofits in California.

Bill Martin, Executive Director of the Central Valley Farmland Trust indicated the donation by Oneto and the Monsanto Fund is much appreciated and will be used to defray the transactional costs for ag conservation easement costs, which add as much as 15 to 20 percent on top of the traditional costs to acquire farmland for preservation.

"To be awarded this grant is significant in a couple ways," said Martin. "First, it acknowledges the important work we are doing and provides direct support of that effort. Second, it is an opportunity to help support the tangential work of others in an effort to bring greater awareness to the importance of farming and how significant the production of food is to our economy and food safety and security."

The America's Farmers Grow Communities program is a part of a broad commitment by Monsanto Company to highlight the important contributions farmers make every day to our society by helping them grow their local communities. Stanislaus County Farmland Mitigation

n 2005, Stanislaus County began the process of updating its General Plan. At the same time, a broad range of citizens, including a County Supervisor, began a discussion of a way to protect farmland from being consumed by housing and commercial development. Stanislaus County is home to some of the richest farmland in the State, generating in excess of \$2.4 billion in annual farm gate revenue, and approximately 10% of its work force is employed within the ag sector. Unfortunately, developing the fertile farmland into sprawling housing developments was a less expensive alternative than trying to develop within the high priced coastal region. And seemingly there was, until the housing bubble burst, plenty of demand for housing in Stanislaus County.

From that discussion, a committee was formed and a two year process of fact finding, public input, and language crafting took place. The result was a definitive farmland mitigation program (FMP) contained within the Ag Element of the County's General Plan. The requirement states, in part, that when farmland is taken out of production for development an equal number of acres of productive farmland must be protected with an ag conservation easement (1:1 ratio). It is important to recognize with this scenario (and simple mathematics) only 50% of the county's farmland would be protected.

The ink had barely dried on the FMP when the Building Industry Association (BIA) filed a lawsuit arguing the program was inherently discriminatory. The lower court's decision supported the BIA. That decision was ultimately overturned by the Court of Appeal. The BIA was then impelled to take the matter to the California Supreme Court. In mid-February 2011, the high court refused to take up the matter and directed the appeals court's ruling to become a legal precedent. Prior to this ruling there was no legal precedent for farmland mitigation programs. This was a significant affirmation of the validity of farmland mitigation programs in California and paves the way for many jurisdictions to consider such programs.

Conserving Becker Farm

armland conservation in the Central Valley took a step forward with the placement of an agricultural conservation easement (ACE) on Becker Farm in San Joaquin County. The farm, located 2 miles north of the town of Linden is 49 acres of prime farmland producing walnuts and cherries. The Becker Farm ACE is the second held by the Central Valley Farmland Trust in San Joaquin County, the first was placed in 2006 on 928 acres near Tracy.

The Becker family, along with friends, CVFT board members, city and county officials, celebrated this accomplishment at the farm in December 2010. "Through the Central Valley Farmland Trust, our family has made a commitment to protect and preserve this agricultural land for generations to come, stated Garrett."

Funding for this project was provided by funds specifically set aside for farmland conservation by Raymus Homes of Manteca and the City of Stockton. The Central Valley Farmland Trust will hold the ACE and the Becker family retains full

control of the farming operation.

"The opportunity to work with landowners like Garrett & Renee Becker, who understand and appreciate the need to protect one of our most precious resources, truly makes my job enjoyable and most rewarding," said Bill Martin, Executive Director of the Central Valley Farmland Trust.
