During fiscal year 2015, substantive improvement in our financial integrity was realized. Additionally, we increased acres conserved to 13,268 from 13,090 in 2014. Total assets increased \$1.4 million, which directly bolsters our ability to provide funding to acquire conservation easements in our area. Because of your support, operational funding capacity remained strong. This secures our ability to continue programs further enhancing our public outreach and communication initiatives, with a lot of work that still needs to be done. Most significantly, our auditors provided an "unqualified opinion" of our financial condition. Simply stated, Central Valley Farmland Trust (CVFT) performed its financial responsibilities in an exemplary manner over this fiscal year.

We take our fiduciary responsibilities very seriously and continually strive to maintain the highest levels of financial integrity. This was recognized by the Land Trust Accreditation Commission by awarding CVFT with an additional five years of national accreditation status, commencing March 1, 2014.





178-ACRE PROJECT AND ACCOMPLISHMENTS



178 ACRES OF FARMLAND CONSERVED

Another 178 acres of farmland, with the added benefit of habitat, will forever remain open and thriving via an agricultural conservation easement through CVFT and the landowner. Solar facilities are a growing trend throughout California and their impacts on farmland and wildlife habitat often require mitigation. In this case, farmland and Swainson's Hawk habitat were impacted and the landowner offset those impacts by placing a conservation easement immediately adjacent to their solar facility. This easement was given to CVFT and required no capital outlay to accomplish. It's a good example of the successful coexistence of wildlife habitat and agriculture. Swainson's Hawk forage in grasslands, sage flats and swaths of agriculture intermixed with native habitat, as this property exemplifies.

PARTNERSHIPS, COLLABORATION & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- Developed strategic relationships, laid the necessary groundwork and subsequent approval of the Madera and Merced County Farm Bureaus to transfer the Agricultural Land Mitigation Fund funds to CVFT. These restricted funds will ensure prime farmland within these counties will be conserved through CVFT.
- The Department of Conservation has invited CVFT to assist the agency in its efforts to mitigate for the loss of farmland due to the high speed rail development in Madera County.
- CVFT has been acknowledged by several jurisdictions as the agricultural land trust with expertise in providing mitigation assistance to individuals and entities in counties where defined mitigation programs are not in effect. These include: Planada Community Services District, Pristine Sun, Merced County Association of Governments, Ecos Energy, and AKT, Inc.
- At every regular board meeting during the fiscal year, each board member has presented portions of critical educational training material on board governance.
- Initiated an aggressive outreach strategy to build committee membership with the ultimate goal of building board membership with high quality people. (see board and committee listing on the back cover)
- Through the efforts of our Trustee Council we were introduced to the California Ag Council for consideration as an allied member. This ongoing and strategic relationship will assist CVFT in sharing how the ag industry and the public can join the movement to conserve California farmland.

FINANCIALS AT A GLANCE


For fiscal year 2015 we are very pleased to report that our conservation easement program activities resulted in closing an additional agricultural conservation easement (ACE) totaling 178 acres in Merced County. This project was provided to CVFT by the landowner to satisfy a local mitigation requirement and no capital outlay was necessary to complete this transaction.

Our net assets increased from \$1,149,712 to \$1,246,694 – consisting primarily of funds set aside for future stewardship and legal defense. Operating expenses increased minimally from \$437,225 to \$443,248. Operating income exceeded expenses by \$61,382.

At fiscal year end we held approximately \$4.3 million versus \$3.0 million (FYE 2014) in mitigation fees received from various municipalities where we have agreements to facilitate their respective farmland mitigation programs. These funds are typically combined with other funding sources to leverage our ability to fund additional acquisitions.

We take the fiduciary administration of our financial records very seriously. For additional information please see our Form 990 posted on our website. If you wish to review our annual audit, please contact our office and we will gladly provide you a copy.

Subsequent Event: On May 27, 2015, under agreement with Merced and Madera County Farm Bureaus, CVFT received approximately \$4.1 million to be utilized to acquire conservation easements in the two counties. This money is the result of a settlement agreement between the Farm Bureaus, et al, and the California High Speed Rail Authority. CVFT worked closely with the Madera and Merced County Farm Bureaus in an effort to facilitate the transfer of funds held by the two entities.
